#### 1) The Vikings before the Vikings in Seaplane Harbour

Fifteen years ago, ship burials were discovered in Saare County that have changed our understanding of the start of the Viking age. The findings of Salme are an important source of the fascinating history of the Vikings. During the special hands-on tour, you will find out more about the new chapter in the history of the Vikings as told by the ship burials of Salme.

#### 2) Medieval cog from Tallinn in Fat Margaret

The museum exhibits the wreck of the oldest ship found in Estonia which is approximately 700 years old. A vessel of this shape is called a cog. Such cogs used to sail the North Sea and the Baltic Sea. During a hands-on tour you can explore various items which were found near the shipwreck and the life of medieval sailors.
